And after months of operating at a temporary location, the Divisadero Farmers' Market has finally returned to its home at the DMV Lot where we bring in a broader selection of fruits, vegetables, and vendors to the neighborhood.

Our team spoke with market-goers across the Bay Area to ask what makes farmers' markets essential, and the answers we received left us inspired and humbled. We saw just how the different facets of our communities work in harmony with one another when we spoke to local restaurateurs and learned about the close relationships many of them have with their farmers.
